About this study

The goal of this study is to point you to Jesus. Who is He? What did He do? What did He say? What does it mean to follow Him and why would I want to do that? To learn about Jesus we will be reading his biography from eye witnesses, discussing His life with the people closest to you and talking directly to Him.

This program is designed to develop five areas of your life. As a foundation we will be spending a lot of time **reading** about Jesus. We will ponder **topics** that reveal and explore the often surprising qualities of Jesus and His teaching. **Perspective** includes articles that help to understand Jesus' way of living. Influence and Service will shape the way we interact with the people around us. **Influence** is a series of tasks focused on meeting the needs of the people around us. The **Service** series examines the way God has made you unique and how to develop a role based on what you do best.

Throughout this study you can expect to read daily, engage in weekly discussions with others, become more involved in the lives of the people around you and to have plenty of questions. This study begins and ends with Jesus and ultimately all those things will point to him.

Day 1

The Life of Jesus

A summary of Mark's Biography

The book of Mark is the account of the life of Jesus we could call, "the gospel on the go." Unlike the other biographers, Mark rushes from one story to another, keeping each one short, pointed, and easy to read. We might even get the impression he meant to pen for a wide audience that could include the youngest hearers possible.

Written probably sometime shortly before AD 70, Mark presents Jesus as "Christ, the son of God." There are a lot of terms here that need some definition and discussion to wrap our minds around them: what is "Christ"? What does this phrase "son of God" mean, exactly? Everything Mark writes is written to address those questions precisely. As you read along, think about how each incident in the life of Jesus demonstrates Him to be "Christ" and "son of God."

Day 2

Reading the Bible

An entire college semester could be spent on the particulars of how to read the Bible. One might initially even remark, "I'm an educated person. I know how to read." However, when reading the Bible, just like any work of antiquity, we need to learn to read not simply at face value. For example, how would what is being said be received in that culture? What themes is the author pointing to? How does where this is happening influence what it means? This is what makes the difference between a high context work of literature and low context. Generally speaking, even when we've correctly understood the words, we might still read and have our understanding fall into one of three categories: 1) we read it and get it 2) we read it and some extra piece of information that wasn't available to us simply by reading the text sheds light and we get it or 3) we read it and no matter how much light is shed we won't get it because we simply didn't live in that context.

This study is founded on the Bible. The Bible was compiled over hundreds of years by different authors who had encounters with God and wrote about their experiences. It is a record of the interaction of God with parts of humanity. The first part of the Bible includes a reoccurring message that things are not ultimately what they should be and that someone is coming who will put things right. The second part of the Bible identifies that Jesus has come and He is putting things right. This process is still going on today and you will be a part of God putting things right in the world.

It's natural at this point to ask questions like "How do you know God exists?" or "Why do you believe the Bible is reliable?" These are very valid and important questions and there are both academic and anecdotal answers for them. As we pursue getting to know Jesus

Reading the Bible continued

through this study, you will likely encounter some of those answers for yourself. To get to know Jesus, this study focuses on the Bible because it is historically the most reliable source of information about Jesus. In the interests of understanding Jesus, we presume the existence of God because Jesus himself lives in that belief.

The reading for the first part of the study will be the biography of Jesus written by a man named Mark. In the Bible, the table of contents at the beginning will tell you which page to turn for the section written by Mark. Look for it shortly after "The New Testament." Mark is divided into 16 chapters. Each chapter is further divided into verses roughly one or two sentences in length. To reference a specific line we use a notation such as "Mark 5:1" which means chapter five, the first verse. "Mark 2:3-7" means chapter two verse three through seven. For this first week, we will read all 16 chapters of Mark. I recommend reading three chapters per day which should take between 20-40 minutes.

Day 3

Perspective

I recently went to see a chiropractor about a back pain I've been having. Apparently my spine was out of alignment and causing pain. Before going I tried fixing the problem myself. My technique just wasn't as effective as the chiropractor.

God designed me and knows me inside and out. He knows the deep issues that I'm not even aware of and He wants to see me healthy.

Life will change as you spend time in God's presence. You will fall in love. You will be amazed to see things the way God does. Sometimes it will hurt like an addict becoming sober.

Welcome to the life you are meant to live.

This section is called perspective because most of that change comes as a result of seeing things from God's perspective. When we understand what He does it and what he values, it changes the way we approach life. Many of the things we value are realized to be quite trivial compared to God's values. Part of gaining wisdom and living differently is aligning what we value to what God values.

Day 3

In the life of the believer, God has even higher callings and standards. This isn't an "earn salvation" type of deal, but rather the response of a grateful, devoted heart to Him who loved her and gave Himself up for her. He did what He did for us, and so because He loved us, we love one another and have to work on being transformed daily more and more into His image.

Day 4

Influence

The message of Jesus is often described as "good news." Part of the process of believing the message is passing it on (who doesn't want to pass on good news?). When one person believes the message of Jesus it is good. But when more people believe that good becomes great for each of them. It multiplies exponentially. Why keep something good for yourself when giving it to others takes your good to a whole new level?

The section on **Influence** will take you step by step as you become someone who can meet real needs and brings good news into the lives of people around you.

Our interaction with people is based on this one truth: God loves the people of this world. This is remarkable because He loves some of the most unlovable scoundrels imaginable. He loves the ones that I can't love. But as I spend time with God, my capacity for love grows to include people who were once beyond me. As our love expands God also expands our influence.

Day 5

Service

Screwdrivers make very poor hammers. A keyboard is not a good substitute for a paintbrush. We are designed uniquely by God to do wonderful things, just not all the same things. I am not like you and you shouldn't try to be like me. In the service sections you will learn how you work, your strengths, weaknesses and God given talents so that you can be effective and satisfied as you work towards your life purpose.

In a company, there are many departments. They aren't all the same and don't all do the same thing, but each is essential to the functioning of the corporation (except, arguably, human resources. Don't believe me? Google "human resources is " and see what the top suggested completions are). God assigns us different tasks according to His desire. Nothing says we can't pursue or ask for certain tasks, but nothing promises we'll receive those requests if He has a plan that goes better with what He is trying to accomplish. No one can improve on perfection.

Remember that we're not the star of the show. God has the right to make us into whatever He wants when He wants. Ours is only to do the next good thing He sets before us. It can be difficult sometimes to simply do so, but we must never let ambition get in the way of accomplishing the small things He wants to do. And there's nothing bigger than the small things.

Day 1

The King

A summary of Matt 1-4

Matthew wants you to know that Jesus is King. Not just any King, He's the Christ or "Heaven sent King". Jesus is the King that all other kings will bow down to. Obviously this is a huge claim so Matthew begins by proving that Jesus is the Heaven-Sent King.

By Birthright, Jesus is the descendant of Kings. God brings Jesus into this world through a miraculous virgin birth. Jesus is sent from heaven.

By Prophecy, The prophets predicted the coming of a Heaven-Sent King known as "the Christ" which is Jesus. Matthew says over and over "this was to fulfill the words of the prophets." The prophets witnessed God work in the history of Matthew's people. These prophets lived between 400-1000 years before Matthew's time yet all of the predictions were proven true.

<u>By Foreign Recognition</u> Magi came from distant countries to recognize Jesus as King.

By Comparison Jesus is a better King than Herod. Herod was the king of the country where Jesus was born. He acquired power using strong and ruthless techniques typical of powerful people. His path is marked by destroying others. While Herod brings death, Jesus brings life. He is the kind of King that gives power to his people. Jesus is the King sent from Heaven.

Jesus the Servant King

Jesus had every right to the most extreme imaginations of what we might think it means to be king of the universe yet he chose to empty himself of all of it. He became obedient to God—even to the point of being put to death wrongfully and in a most painful and humiliating way. That is why when he reigns as king of kings he really has every right to do so since he himself has been where we are. And as we learn to take the humble attitude of a servant, we find a power unknown to those who simply demand to be waited on hand and foot.

Like the King of kings, we discover that it's in losing our lives that we truly find them.

Day 3

The Constitution

A summary of Matt 5-7

Jesus is bringing the Kingdom of Heaven to earth. What is this kingdom like? What does the King expect from his citizen?

Jesus begins telling us that his values are different than the world. The world says love your friends; hate your enemies. Jesus says love your enemies. He demands forgiveness, honesty, humility, generosity, modesty and faithfulness. That's the kind of Kingdom Jesus offers.

King Jesus introduces a deeper ethic based on attitude not actions. To Him hatred and murder are the same thing and equally unacceptable. Judgment is based on what's inside the heart of a person. Jesus knows that fixation on evil thoughts leads to evil deeds. Jesus' requirements are impossibly high but every time we fail He demands that we forgive ourselves and those around us. We must also accept forgiveness when it is given.

Jesus introduces a new system of internal governance. With God's help from within, I take control of myself instead of an external government controlling me from the outside.

The people were surprised because Jesus didn't speak like a teacher. He spoke like He has authority. He speaks like a King.

Day 4

God Loves the World

God loves all the people of this world and that makes all the difference.

In the past I would look for great accomplishments of fame or beauty. I would look for people who think like me or have toys that I like.

But now there is no accomplishment greater than being loved by God. And everyone I see is loved by God. Now I have to look at them differently.

I have a different way of seeing the significance of people because. How could a gold medal compare to the Love of God? By His love, all people are significant. I see my boss whom God loves, my friend whom God loves, the cashier whom God loves. Every person I see is loved by God, even the one in the mirror. I am loved by God, I am significant.

Love is a word that gets thrown around quite a bit. It has several definitions in English, and which one we mean depends on context. We don't, for example, love our spouses the way we love pizza. This makes room, of course, for those who wish to dally around play word games with the word love to guilt others into one thing or another (i.e., "If you truly loved me, you'd...").

When we say that God loves the whole world we don't mean the kind of love where He approves of everything the world does. Rather, we mean that seemingly psychologically dysfunctional love that a mother and father would have for their child—even if she's a convicted offender. The parents of such a person might agree that what she did was deplorable. They wouldn't blame the justice system for sending their

daughter to prison for a long time. But they would still continue to love her. That's because God's love isn't an object-oriented love that depends on the one being loved, but the one doing the loving. Of course, some might reject that love. Continued on unto death, what more can our Maker do? If we reject Him unto death, then what hope can we have?

Day 1

Power

A summary of Matt 8&9

These chapters are a snapshot of the kind of power Jesus has. Power to heal disease, power over the natural world, power over the spiritual world, power over death; Jesus has the power to forgive sins against God.

How does Jesus use his power?

Jesus only uses his power to do the will of the God.

He gives power to his disciples.

He never uses his power for himself.

Reflection:

What kind of abilities do you have? (Skills, talents, finances, respect.) Do you use your 'powers' like Jesus does? – to do the will of God, giving to others and never for your own advancement? Do you know people that use their abilities the way Jesus uses his power?

Ambassadors

A summary of Matt 10

Now that Jesus has demonstrated what kind of power his kingdom wields he sends out messengers to invite to his fellow countrymen to join his Kingdom. Consider this an invitation to you as well.

"The Kingdom of Heaven is here, will you join?"

Jesus gave his messengers the same power he just demonstrated in chapters 8&9. They were given power to heal, power over nature and power over the supernatural. The messengers weren't just sent out to talk about the Kingdom, they were demonstrating what the kingdom is all about.

Jesus the Powerful

- Healed a paralyzed man
- Healed a crippled man
- Healed a man with withered hand
- Healed a Blind man possessed by a demon
- Calmed a fierce storm while at sea
- Healed two men possessed by daemons
- · Raised to life Jairus' daughter
- Healed a woman with an Issue of blood*
- Restored sight to Two blind men
- Healed a man possessed by a demon, unable to speak
- Fed Five thousand people using the a boy's lunch
- Walked on the sea
- Healed a foreign woman's daughter
- Healed a man deaf and unable to speak
- Fed 4,000 people with seven loaves and a few small fish
- Restored sight to a blind men
- Healed a boy possessed by a suicidal daemon
- Miraculously provided tax money
- Healed the eyes of one born blind
- Healed a woman sick for 18 years and unable to stand

- Healed a man with Dropsy
- Healed ten lepers
- Raised to life Lazarus after three days
- Restored sight to two blind beggars
- Restored the ear of a soldier attempting to arrest him
- Ended the tyranny of death by returning to life three days after his public execution

I'd like to bring special attention to two of his healings that go beyond the physical.

Jesus raised a widow's son to life, certainly this was a gift for the son, but even more so for the widow. She lived in a male dominated society where she didn't even have the right to represent herself in court. With the death of her son this widow was steps away from begging by the side of the road. Jesus returned her son to life. He was this widow's last living male relative to care for her in her twilight years and carry on her family's honor after she passed away. With just a touch, Jesus gave the widow her son, her provision and her legacy.

Secondly there was a woman who'd been bleeding constantly for twelve years. Because of the nature of her disease she would have been despised by her society. Secretly she was able to touch the corner of Jesus' sleeve and be healed. Jesus immediately stopped everything and the crowd that was with him. He looked squarely at the woman and announced to the crowed that she is now healed. He restored her socially, because it's not enough to just heal the body.

Day 3

Grace

As an adult the world's economy is based on buying, selling and trading. Growing up as a kid my economy was: ask dad and he gives.

This is God's economy. Not an exchange - He doesn't make deals. He gives gifts. We can't work harder for more. He gives to us freely and simply. The gifts shape us. The word for God's economy is *grace*.

Grace – God does for us what we can't do, as a gift that empowers us to overcome.

As a definition grace has four parts:

- Happy. To be delighted.
- a common greeting in the ancient world: "Grace to you" was a way of saying "May you be happy" or "I'm delighted to be with you."
- Grace is a gift. Not earned. You can't work for it.
 You can't be entitled to it. It is given freely.
- **Empowerment**. Increase in power, energy or ability. You are now stronger and more capable.

All together grace could be understood as:

God meets us with a gift that strengthens and delights.

Welcome to God's economy.

Day 1

The Wonder of the Kingdom Matt 11-13

Jesus sent out invitations to the Kingdom, delivered by his students (ch10) but the response wasn't all positive. The Kingdom of Heaven is here but it's not from this world and it certainly isn't what people expected. Jesus is the long awaited King sent from Heaven but he doesn't fit their idea.

Some people just didn't get it.

It seems that some people came to Jesus with high expectations of what the Kingdom should be. They already have it all figured out and Jesus is not what they were expecting. They went away disappointed.

In chapters 11 and 12 Jesus encounters opposition. This isn't just pushback from the initial campaign in chapter 10; this is a story about who is ready to enter the Kingdom of Heaven and who isn't. In one of many ironic twists of the Kingdom the people you most expect to be ready for Jesus; (ie. smart religious leaders) are not ready to accept Jesus.

They can't get beyond their expectations of what a Savior from God and a Kingdom from God should be. They aren't ready to follow God's plan because they are too hung up on themselves.

You may be surprised by some of the things you learn about Jesus and His kingdom as well. Take a cue from Jesus' good friend John the Baptist. John humbly sent his questions to Jesus and simply trusted what Jesus said.

Those who simply accept that the Kingdom of Heaven is what Jesus says it is, marvel at its wonder. They are the most satisfied. Will you allow yourself to be delighted in the wonder of the Kingdom?

Day 2

Jesus is Subversive

The world has a certain way of doing things. Jesus has a way of doing things that is different than this world.

Change can be scary. Some just prefer their familiar evils. Taking a stand against evil makes enemies of people who embrace those destructive patterns. Doing so will create conflict, opposition, and at the very least make you unpopular. Opposing debt, for example, brings the wrath of the financial industry but also that of those who enjoy the fruits of their debt.

Jesus stood opposed to oppressive systems and people (debt, addiction, ignorance, corrupt justice, and religious control, just to name a few). These systems made people who could otherwise be citizens of Heaven into slaves of someone else.

Jesus was a friend of the sinners and other social outcast but he was hated by those in power.

Jesus spent his days in the company of people society throws away like garbage.

He personally educated women in a culture that stood opposed to it.

At one time, Jesus was asked if citizens of his Kingdom should pay taxes to another Kingdom like Rome - which stood opposed to the Kingdom of Heaven.

His instructions were brilliant: "Caesar's face is on the money so give it all back to him." By devaluing Rome's currency, Jesus's followers would have led to a financial collapse of the Roman Empire, making Rome financially dependent on Jesus's Kingdom - all while paying their taxes to Rome.

Jesus didn't set out to make friends but to undermine the destructive patterns of this world as he established a Kingdom of heaven here on earth. Welcome to a new Kingdom.

Reading Today: Matthew 12

I am a citizen of the Kingdom of Heaven

"My Kingdom is not from this world" -Jesus

Jesus didn't establish a new religion. He started the revolution of a new nation, a kingdom. His kingdom is not like the nations of the world. It has been called upside-down and backwards because our patterns are so different. Let me give you a couple examples.

His kingdom and its resources are used for the benefit of those outside the kingdom.

This kingdom has no borders or geography. Wherever you find people who trust God, the Kingdom of Heaven is there. Every citizen is also an ambassador to the nations of the earth. We could all have diplomatic immunity except that God wants us to live accountable to the laws of the nations of earth as well.

All nations of this earth have a type of police to administer laws and justice. This is a type of external control originating outside of the individual citizen. There is a force outside the citizens that keeps them in line. Jesus' Kingdom is different. It relies on an internal system of self-control. God's Spirit lives in us telling us right from wrong. There is no external system in place, only the spirit keeps us inline. We either trust his wisdom or we don't.

God is King. This nation is a theocracy, ruled by God. Other nations have been ruled by religious orders and called themselves theocracies but this is different. We are governed by God directly and internally; there is no religious order standing between us and God.

Our Government is fueled by trust. It's a new kind of government where citizens are accountable directly to God. And He teaches us self-control a type of self-governing based on the spirit of God. The new standard of right and wrong is based on my heart, attitude and intentions not my external actions. We trust our king and learn to trust him with more parts of our lives. The more we trust Him the more good we can do as a nation.

This kingdom has a new kind of social services where every citizen gives generously and gladly to those in need even though it puts them in a difficult position.

Jesus established a new nation and personally invites you to be a citizen of the Kingdom of Heaven.

Day 4

Jesus' Family - Influence

Everyone has family issues, even Jesus. At one point his mother and half-brothers showed up to have him taken away believing he was insane. It's not so hard to imagine from the perspective of Jesus' family. They grew up together. How many times did Mary change his diapers? What kind of childish mischief did Jesus' brothers see? Now he's going around claiming to be sent from God to inaugurate God's Kingdom of Heaven on earth. Did he really think he would build a kingdom that would outlast the mighty Roman Empire? Jesus said no prophet has honor in his home town. He literally couldn't do any miracles in Nazareth. They were so stuck on the boy growing up that they couldn't believe Jesus the Messiah.

It's difficult to break through to family. We are set in our patterns and everyone involved is enforcing that awkward balance that is our family dynamic. Growth requires change and that is good. Jesus can make family better. Family might your parents and siblings, your spouse and children or all of the above - God has a good plan for your family. There will be resistance to change but be hopeful.

It probably didn't happen during Jesus' life time on earth but his half-brother James became an apostle of Jesus and leader of the church in Jerusalem. James became a foundational figure in the Kingdom of God.

Day 1

Following Jesus

A summary of Matt 14-18

Jesus' cousin John the Baptist is executed and Jesus knows that his death is coming soon. But before that he wants to make sure his disciples are ready to take over after he goes. In this week's section Jesus gives his students opportunities to take their training to the next level. In the past they've been learning from Jesus and following his directions, now they will start to imitate Jesus. It was the custom in those days that students imitate every aspect of their teacher's life. Peter specifically steps up to be like Jesus. He succeeds gloriously and fails just as miserably but he keeps trying. Living in a way that imitates Jesus doesn't come naturally it take practice.

Jesus helps his disciples to see beyond the surface and the physical. He helps them to get beyond food and rituals and start living life by things that are intangible like personal motives and influence.

Several times Jesus tells his students that He is going to be killed which naturally sounds like this revolution of the Kingdom of Heaven is going to fail. Certainly this is distressing to Jesus' disciples. Then he challenges his beloved students to follow him through a failure's death (take up your cross). Following Jesus is a difficult road indeed. Even though Peter failed over and over he kept trying. With God's help Peter lived and died following Jesus. With God's help, will you follow Jesus all the way?

Jesus wraps up this training by highlighting his expectation of his students as they learn to imitate him. Even though they are stepping into leadership positions he wants them to be humble. He is a king that acts like a servant. He turns leadership around. In his culture, kings lead by fear and oppression. Jesus did the opposite, leading by serving and compassion. And he told his students that when you serve the weak you'll receive a king's reward. He concludes with a story of forgiveness which showing the importance of being affected and changed by the gifts God gives.

Reading Today: Matthew 14

Day 2

Jesus the Healer

Look again at the list of Jesus' miracles in week 4. Notice healing seems to dominate the list. Not only did Jesus have power over all kinds of disease by he gave that ability to his disciples.

But healing was at best a secondary objective. His true calling was to repair the relationship between humanity and God. This relationship is founded on trust which is built up by the Kingdom of God. God paints a picture of his character and trustworthiness in the lives of his citizens. As they trust Him with more and more parts of their lives his faithfulness in more readily displayed.

What about this gift of healing? Would it surprise you to know that we can already heal others. Just imagine the kind of medical advancements we've made in the past 2000 years. Even more significant to public health is basic sanitation and clean drinking water. It's not as flashy as being able to snap your fingers and heal but in terms of raw numbers no medical advancement has done more for public health than clean drinking water.

Today, one in ten people on earth do not have access to clean drinking water. A small group of 6-8 people have the financial ability to heal a large village. You may not feel rich but financially you have the ability to heal more people than Jesus did. It was after all His desire that we exceed his work. But that requires that we use our gifts for God's will and not our lifestyle. Why would God give us supernatural talent if we don't use our natural talents? Debt and lack of trust are hindering our ability to heal. Jesus regularly indicated that healing relates to trusting him.

Are we likely to see supernatural healing? It may depend on trusting God with your life, not just an immediate situation. Are you following Jesus' example? Using your abilities to do God's will? Giving yourself to others and not spending your life on yourself? Maybe by following Jesus you can receive the gift of the Holy Spirit.

Reading Today: Matthew 15

Day 3

Freedom

If you grew up in the mid-western part of the U.S., there is a good chance that you spent some time as a child catching fireflies on warm summer evenings. Those slow-flying glowing bugs were easy to catch, and it was fun to watch them crawl and glow inside the jar or bug cage you put them in. They would often make their way to the top of the jar or the door of the bug cage, but a slight tap on the top would send the clumsy bugs to the bottom so that the lid could be opened and more could be added. At times the bugs would seem somewhat confused – seeing the outside world, yet banging into an invisible shield every time they flew towards it. The bugs were trapped, life-threateningly trapped.

There are a lot of things in life that can make us feel trapped as well. Perhaps you feel trapped by a wound from your past, an inability to forgive someone, an addiction, a perpetual need to please others, fear, anger, depression, or worry about the future. There is an endless list of things that can make us feel trapped. We are on the inside of the jar --- longing to fly free only to find ourselves hitting a wall. We may feel confused—not realizing that we are in a jar and trying to fly in different directions or worse we've given up flying altogether convinced that there is no hope. The good news is that Jesus came that we might experience freedom --- a freedom that only comes when we choose to follow Him.

First, you must understand how you got into the jar. The answer to that is **sin**. The Bible tells us that all of us have "sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). Sin traps us, making us its slave and ultimately leads to eternal death. Romans 6:23 says, "For the wages of sin is death." All of us have sinned, all of us have been trapped, and all of us are in need of being saved from death! If all of us have sinned, and all are in the jar, who can get us out? Who can save us? It has to be someone without sin---someone not in the jar—Jesus.

The Bible says that "God so loved the world that he sent his one and only Son." Jesus freely came to earth. He did not sin, yet he paid the penalty for our sins. He died so that we would have a way out of the jar. Not only that, he also came alive again – demonstrating his power over death for all time. Jesus took the lid off the jar and he stands at the entrance to freedom. There is only one way out, and that's through Jesus. First, we must realize that we are in the jar. We must confess our sin, acknowledge our need for him, and choose to follow Him. When we do this, he forgives our sins, welcomes us into his family, and begins to transform our lives.

Being free does not mean that I am now in control over my circumstances or that I now carry everything out with perfection. On the contrary, I have given control of my past, present, and future circumstances to God, trusting that he is powerful, he is good, he has forgiven me, and his love for me is greater than my own understanding. The freedom comes in yielding to Him. While living on earth, I know that I will have trials. I will not always do things perfectly. I will not always please others. I will experience injustice. I will sometimes be sad. However, there is freedom in knowing that Christ will never fail. He will never leave me. He is my helper. He will always love me. He holds the future. I have the hope of heaven. I also have a purpose in praising Him, following Him, and telling others about the freedom I've found in Him.

Reversing the World's Values

A summary of Matthew 19-23

Jesus turns everything upside down. Values, Wealth, Right, Advancement, Success, Power, all the things we strive for in life, all of it upside down. The First will be last and the Last will be first. Jesus turns attention from the powerful people to the powerless people. Jesus looks at the ones that we overlook.

He turned money upside down and said it is hard to enter the Kingdom of heaven if you are wealthy.

He turned religion upside down declaring that prostitutes and traitors will enter the kingdom before the religious leaders.

In his day every leader understood the privilege of their position was to be served. Jesus said he came to serve, not to be served.

Jesus stood against those who use power to oppress people. Perhaps when Jesus looked into the faces of the oppressed he recognized the image of the God who made them and loves them.

Jesus takes action that he knew would lead to his death. He throws out the powerful and gives to the destitute.

The temple was built to be a place where people could come to be close to God. Unfortunately the administrators of the temple saw an opportunity for profiteering and had long ago turned it into an extortion racket. Jesus threw them out, enough is enough! How dare they use God as a way to extort people. This move quickly leads to his assassination. But it seems that Jesus intended to provoke their deadly response. If I'm going to get killed might as well go out lifting up the people that God loves so much.

Day 2

The Image of God

The Stradivarius Violins are 300 year old Italian violins and considered the greatest violins ever created. No one since the days of Antonio Stradivari has been able to reproduce the craftsmanship and sound quality of these violins. They have sold at auctions for 1-3 million dollars. They can only be found in museums, private collections of the wealthy and in the hands of the greatest musicians of our day. What a tragedy it would be to find a Stradivarius Violin being used to prop up the leg of a kitchen table!

There is a dignity and respect that goes with being human. We are creatures of immense worth and value far beyond any masterpiece violin. It is tragic to find humanity treated below our value. Worse is to find a human being embrace the lie and behave as though they have so little value.

You are the object of desire in the eyes of the High King of Creation. God loves you. This is the source of your worth, not accomplishment or entitlement. It isn't the quality of being human that makes you worthy. Your value comes from God's estimation of your worth. Your worth is beyond measure. His desire for you is uncontainable. Unbelief does not see this value because it comes from God.

Behavior follows belief. When we believe we must accomplish to be valuable then we will measure ourselves and others by that destructive scale. But if our worth comes from God and there is nothing we can do to diminish his love for us. Not just me but everyone I see family, friends, neighbors, co-workers, acquaintances, store clerks, and laborers. Even the smallest least substantial or most crippled life is a person of immense worth.

Seeing God's love for us compels us to live as a child of the King. Seeing God's love for others compels us to treat others with the same immense dignity.

Through Christ we claim our value, recognizing that all of humanity is created in his image. We become adopted children of God through Jesus the "firstborn" child of God.

We bear his image and his love.

There's a story Jesus tells about a son who rejects his family and leaves home. The father neglects his other duties and social obligations because nothing is more important to him than reconciling with his son. As with most of his stories Jesus is making a point to help us better understand God. In his story the father who represents God spends his days personally watching the road, anticipating the moment his child returns.

This week get to know your neighbors. Remember God loves them as his children. As children of the King of the universe they are VIPs, but then again so are you.

You can be a bridge between your neighbor and God. They may be indifferent to God, hostile towards Him or they may be living in step with God. No matter where they are on life's journey, there is room for growth and greater trust in God. There is a reason God put them in your life and they may be a source of growth for your faith.

Action step:

Time to get better acquainted. At a minimum get to know their name. Try learning about their family history. If you need some ice breaker suggestions try the following:

- Prepare an interesting story
- Tell a joke or two
- Ask a mix of casual and interested questions
- Remember It's ok to be a little odd
- Don't bet the farm on a single meeting
- Use your best judgment as you get to know your neighbor.

Day 4

What to do while I'm away...

A summary of Matthew 24-25

This section is one of the most confusing sections in the Bible. On the surface Jesus is talking about a coming cataclysm and some all-around scary stuff.

Before this section Jesus prepared his disciples to take over leadership after he leaves (Matt 14-18). In the events leading up to this speech Jesus demonstrated what they are to do while he is away (Matt 19-23). Now it's time to talk about his absence. I'm going away and while I'm gone take care of the powerless.

His disciples ask three questions about future events. Jesus answered their questions, but his answers are very complicated. But he quickly turns the discussion from when this will happen to what they should do in the meantime. Be ready! Use your resources to continue the mission. The last story of sheep and goats; righteous and unrighteous summarizes this speech and gives a beautiful answer to this confusion.

Humbly, I'd like to offer this two line summary of Matt 24-25

Disciples: When will we see you again?

Jesus: When you look in the face of the struggling you will see me again.

This leaves a question in your hands, dear reader. Jesus looked in the face of the destitute and saw worth, value and dignity - the image of God. He loved them and gave all he had. When you look in the face of the poor, hungry, thirsty, naked, homeless or sick - what will you do?

Reading Today: Matthew 24

Sacrifice and Glory of Jesus

There are at least 12 different appearances of Christ in the resurrection accounts, beginning with Mary and ending with Paul. They were physically tangible experiences with Christ eating, speaking and allowing himself to be touched. Jesus' resurrected body was different from his physical body. It was no longer subject to the same laws of nature. He could transcend locked doors, and yet he could still be touched and he could eat. The stone was not rolled away from the tomb so Jesus could get out. He was able to walk through walls in his resurrected body. The stone was rolled away so that everyone could see that he had risen.

Abundant life

Why do so many people who acquire great wealth say their life is empty? Why do people surrounded by fame turn to drugs to escape their life? We spend so much time chasing bigger and better because we so quickly bore of the same.

There's a common phenomenon that happens to people who have a near death experience. The priorities of life change. Some describe it as having a new lease on life. They become more interested in the things that really matter and they spend less time chasing trivial activities that don't matter to them. They have changed their idea of what better life means to them.

Exposure to Jesus causes a similar phenomenon. People who spend time with Jesus have a *near-life-experience*. Life becomes better but more importantly we change what we want in life. Our idea of a better life changes in the presence of Jesus. Jesus offers a life more significant, satisfying, purposeful, fitting, full of struggles that strengthen and work that fills. Life with Jesus is better.

Jesus is a master of living life and giving life. He teaches us how to truly live. We rearrange our priorities choose people over things and genuine expressions of love over social pleasantries or obligations. Jesus offers us a life of significance, a life that satisfies. Life becomes richer, deeper and truer as we step more in line with the God who designed us.

Day 3

Eternal Life

Jesus offers eternal life. The life he offers isn't just better but there's more of it. Even after we die, life continues it just changes into life after death. It goes on and on forever. That's hard to imagine because there is literally nothing in human experience that is infinite. So Jesus' offer of eternal life is so big there is nothing we can compare with it.

Even looking out into the vastness of space the most powerful telescopes can see all the way to "the observable edge of the universe" where there is nothing but background radiation from the beginning of time. But that still isn't eternal.

To imagine eternity picture all the days of your life from birth until now, and from now until death. Imagine all those days maybe 70+ years are the thickness of a hair. Not length, thickness of a hair. That is your entire life all the days you have had and will have on earth. Now image 5 hairs laying side by side no gaps between them, all together not even a 1/8 of an inch. That's roughly 350 years taking you back to the time before electricity, before America to a time of colonial exploration.

Now picture ten hairs laying side by side: a total length of ½ mm. That's roughly 700 years or before the Europe had the printing press.

How many life time-hairs would be needed to cross your desk? Go ahead and look at your desk and a hair right now. How many life time hairs would to cover the distance from you to the door of the room you are in. Or from you to exit the building you are in? We are well beyond the scale of years we can imagine but we are nowhere near eternity. So

take your chain of life-time-hairs and imagine traveling south by land all the way to the ocean, one lifetime hair at a time. Now continue across the ocean floating on the surface until you reach the next continent. Continue across land and sea one life time hair at a time traveling south until there is no more south to go. You have reached the southern pole. Take a moment to look out a window facing south and imagine all the life times it would take to reach the south end of the world?

But we're still not to eternity. Now to get to eternity, just turn to your right. Instead of going south go west and continue traveling around the earth forever. One lifetimehair at a time. That is the length of eternity.

Like anything God offers to humanity, the significance of what he gives is so far beyond what it costs us to acquire, that nothing short of lunacy would reject such a gainful offer. Only a fool would ask for a discount when the profit is unimaginably beyond the asking price?

Day 1

Prophecy

Trusting God in the present, Trusting God in the future

Before Jesus' life on earth, God spent over 1000 years investing in the Jewish people. Apart from God they should have died as slaves building pyramids for the Pharaohs of Egypt. But God wanted to display his love for mankind using these slaves as a tapestry. He rescued them and built them into a mighty nation - Israel.

The history of God interacting with Israel is peppered with promises and expectation that someday God would give them a King sent from Heaven. They referred to this promise as the "Messiah" or "Son of God." This King was said to establish the Kingdom of Heaven on earth and turn the hearts of all people toward God not just Jews.

Jesus arrived at a point when Israel was declining and soon after his departure the nation would be completely dissolved. But for those who accepted his invitation to join the Kingdom of Heaven God would reveal that he kept his promise to the descendants of Abraham all along.

These promises from God were known to the people as prophecies and there are over 300 promises about the Messiah and his Kingdom. Jesus was adamant about keeping God's promises. He fulfilled all 300+ promises in his time on earth proving that he is the Messiah from God. Tomorrow we'll look at 20 specific promises to see how Jesus fulfilled them.

A prophetic message was often given for two situations: it would address a present issue and future issue yet to be revealed. The same message would address both present and future events. The most practical application of prophecy was answering the present question, "God what should we do now?" Sometimes the same message also foreshadowed a future event that would follow a similar pattern. At its core prophecy is simply a message from God, but God has an ability to teach the same lesson for two different circumstances. A small crisis in the present will demonstrate God's faithfulness as a setup to us trusting Him later when the stakes are higher.

And that is the point, building trust with God. It builds trust in God when we see the event unfold as He described. For example: You may be facing crushing financial ruin. God might say I'll save you from this debt, you and your children's children. There is an imitated situation and God proves himself. Later your grand-children may face a larger financial crisis as they lead a major company. Should they declare bankruptcy? They can remember the time when God saved you from debt and trust that God will save them as he saved you so many years before.

Often a prophecy will be implied though demonstration instead of spoken explicitly. This type of prophecy is similar to profiling – recognizing someone by aspects of who they are. This is how people recognized the association between Jesus and God because they both use similar methods. When Jesus provided food for 5000 people using practically nothing, it was similar to a time the nation of Israel was starving in the desert and God provided food. In his culture the people would have seen the connection and recognized the association between Jesus's miraculous provision and God's miraculous provision.

Day 2

Jesus is Unique

Adapted from <u>How did people know Jesus was comina?</u> by Mark Driscoll Let's take a look at some of the specific promises God gave about the coming Messiah and how only Jesus fulfilled these promises.

1) Species: Human, Male born of a woman

Genesis 3:15 says the Messiah would be a man and there would be triumph over the Devil.

The Messiah is human. Not animal, Angel, element, force of nature or period of time.

2) Ethnicity/Family descent: Abraham – Isaac – Jacob – Judah


Genesis 12:3 the messiah will be a descendant of **Abraham**, he will bless all nations.

Genesis 17:19 God's promise will be established through Isaac

Numbers 24:17 "a star out of **Jacob**, a scepter out of Israel." Scepter was symbolic of a king.

Gen 49:10 "the scepter with Judah"

The Messiah will come as a male, born from a female. He will come from the family of Abraham but he will come from Isaac, not Ishmael. He'll come from Jacob not Esau. And he'll come from Judah, not of any of his other 11 brothers. So now we're really narrowing down the coming of Jesus and we're getting a clear picture of the family he will come from and descend from.



3) Born of a Virgin

Isaiah 7:14 "God will give you a sign, the Virgin will give birth to a son, you're to call him 'Immanuel' meaning God with us"

4) Location of Birth: Bethlehem

Micah 5:2 " out of Bethlehem one to rule, king of kings whose origins are from ancient times."

The Messiah is coming from Bethlehem.

5) Moral status: Perfect

Isaiah 53:9 did nothing wrong, sinless

So, we're waiting for a man born of a woman, from the family of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Judah, whose mother would be a virgin who would be born in Bethlehem and would never commit any sin. Right, I mean — we're getting the pieces of the jigsaw puzzle as it were, and as we put them together we're coming into a clear and clearer picture of the coming of Jesus long before he actually arrived.

6) Time spent in Egypt

Hosea 11:1 "out of Egypt I will call my son" As a boy, Jesus spent time as a refugee in Egypt

7) Timing: Heralded by another prophet & arriving at the temple.

Isaiah 40:3 "a voice coming before him from the wilderness, prepare the way for God" John the Baptist, cousin of Jesus spent a lot of time Prophesying in the wilderness.

Malachi 3:1 "I will send my messenger, who will prepare the way before me. Then the Lord will come to his temple."

There has not been a temple of almost 2000 years. The temple was destroyed in 70ad. The messiah had to come before this. But there had not been a prophet for 400 years prior. This is very specific timing: Must be before the Temple is destroyed and during the time of another prophet. Only the life time of John the Baptist qualifies. Before 400BC prophets were still saying, the messiah is yet to come. After70AD the temple was destroyed. 400BC-70AD, There was no other prophet until John came. The only time the Messiah could come was during the life time of John the Baptist.

8) Miraculous Healer

Isaiah 35:5-6 - heals the blind, ears, deaf, lame, mute

9) Riding a donkey into Jerusalem

Zechariah 9:9 "your King will come with salvation, gentle riding on a donkey"

Kings who rode horses established their authority through war and conquest. Kings who rode donkeys were established by peace. This is symbolic of a mission of peace and that his authority came from God, not military strength.

10) Betrayed by a close friend ...

Psalm 41:9 betrayed by a close friend

11) ... for 30 pieces of silver, the money would be used to by potter's field

Zachariah 11:12-13 they paid 30 pieces of silver

Again the details are astonishing; that the women would give birth to a son who came from the line Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Judah, that the mother would be a virgin and she would give birth to the son in Bethlehem. That as a boy he would be taken to Egypt that he would grow up without committing any sin. That he would go to the temple before 70 AD. Those later in life, a friend of his, who say him perform the miracles that were prophesied and had broken bread with him on many occasions, would betray him for 30 pieces of silver, which would be thrown in to disgust into the temple and used to buy potter's field.

12) Silent in his defense

Isaiah 53:7 oppressed and afflicted did not open his mouth

13) Striped of his clothes

Psalm 22:18 divided garments, cast lots

14) Beaten

Isaiah 50:6, Offered my back to those who beat me.

15) No bones broken

Exodus 12:4-6 not a bone will be broken (Passover sacrifice)
Psalms 34:20 not a bone will be broken (Messiah)

16) Specific wounds

Psalms 22:16 pierced my hands and feet Zachariah 12:10 pierced my side

17) Forsaken by God

Psalms 22:1 Forsaken by God, - taking our sin upon himself

False accusations would be made and he would not defend himself. He would maintain his dignity, and he would continue forth with his mission. His back would be bloodied that his reputation would be attached. That he would be crucified through his hands and his feet between two thieves. The garments that he wore would be stripped off, would be taken from him and be distributed. One piece of which would be won by someone in a dice game. And that none of his bones would be broken but on the cross he would be forsaken by God the Father.

18) Executed beside sinners

Isaiah 53:12 murdered and placed with sinners

19) Died

Isaiah 53:9 cut off from the land of the living, assigned a grave with wicked, although he had done no violence, nor deceit, rich man's tomb

Was Jesus put to death with sinners? -One on his right, one on his left, in fulfillment of the prophecy of Isaiah. That not only would he be put to death, look at the details leading up to death of Jesus, betrayed by a close friend who ate meals with him, for 30 pieces of silver that was used to buy a field. Falsely accused, despised hated, people saying atrocious things about him, mocked, pierced through the hands and the feet and side, and crucified with thieves who were guilty and deserved to die.

20) Resurrected

Psalms 16:10 "You will not abandon me to the grave, nor will you let your holy one see decay"

Psalms 49:15

Isaiah 53:10 Guilt offering Sacrifice, see his offspring, prolong his days. the Will of God will prosper in his hand after the suffering of his soul. He will see the light of life and be satisfied.

Did Jesus rise from death? Yes. He did. And it was seen by multitudes of people, upward of 500 at a time. His mothers, his brothers, saw it. His friends his enemies saw it. Crowds saw it. Men and women saw it. Young and old saw it. It was a fact. And he maintained his witness of being alive for 40 days. Even with the doubters like Thomas, "Touch my scars, I was dead and now I'm alive." That happened on a Sunday, that's why we worship on Sunday.

Did Jesus set up his life so that all the things met the prophecy? You don't pick your mom, your place of birth. And after you die you don't have a big say in where they put you. I mean, these are things before he was born and after he died that were promised in Scripture showing that not only is it all true but it is beyond a shadow of a doubt, factual that these were not situations manufactured by Jesus, to fool us. You have to confess, we really whittled down the list. You got to find a guy whose mom was a virgin that was born in Bethlehem before 70 AD died and is still alive. It is a very short list. Even if you went to public school, you go, "That's a short list right there." I went to public school and I think - I mean, it's a short list. I've heard other people say, "Well, maybe it was somebody else." Who? Give me one other dude with this resume. You know, there is no one else. Jesus is the fulfillment of all these prophecies. And not only that but it tells us, "That he will ascended into heaven and sit at the right hand of God." So it completes the whole full circle ministry of Jesus from; in heaven to the earth, death, burial, resurrection, ascension, back into heaven at the right hand of the Father.

Day 1

Summary of Luke

We've called Mark's account of the life of Jesus "the gospel on-the-go." It's for the person who has little time for extensive details. She wants the bottom line: "Can I get, like, the Cliff's Notes version of this and if I want details, I'll ask?"

By contrast, Luke is a scholar's delight—a detailed, two-volume, full scroll-length document that goes into filling in details that Mark was too busy running around to mention. The language that's used is that of a learned man who is laying down good foundations. He's done his research carefully. He's methodical. He's even well-funded by an apparent single source named Theophilus (who could have, in turn, been the spearhead fund raiser in Luke's behalf). In fact, Luke himself was a physician (Colossians 4:14) and this document, for the intellectuals and the detail-oriented, is just what the doctor ordered.

Luke presents us with this Messiah who just doesn't fit the bill with anyone

Even the forerunner to the Messiah is named, "John"-something out of sync with standardized naming protocol ("There is no one among your relatives who has that name" = "That's not normal. That's weird. Pick. Something. Normal").

The forerunner, John, is also of unusual birth—born to an older, barren woman. John was still regarded as a prophet of God—but not by the religious elite

The Son of Man Week 9

10 Themes to look for in Luke's Gospel

 God's big picture plan for all humanity God's plan unfolds steadily calm and measured. Jesus is in control of each scene. He is the fulfillment of prophecies and He is the perfect answer at just the right time, and we anticipate his return.

- 2. Jesus: "The Son of Man"
- 3. Salvation for all people
- Radical inclusiveness Jesus seemed to have a deep love for people from the "wrong demographic"
- Table fellowship In Luke, Jesus is either at a meal, going to a meal or coming from a meal. Meals are places where Jesus demonstrates his program of inclusiveness crossing social boundaries.
- The Holy Spirit, Good news, Joy and Praises to God!
 These appear frequently and there may be a connection.
- Prayers of Jesus and others. Even his prayers were unconventional.
- 8. Parables Jesus told stories to teach eternal lessons.

Foreigners: Gentiles, Romans, Samaritans

Sinners: prostitutes, tax collectors

Women: Jesus taught women. Treated them as disciples; reversing the cultural prohibition against allowing women to learn.

Jesus the Friend

It's not surprising that Jesus loved sinners. Jesus was a great guy and didn't get caught on the same issues that make religious people furrow their brow. By contrast religious teachers prided themselves on who they didn't associate with.

Some religious teachers bragged about throwing rocks at "undesirable" people. One traditional prayer that is still common today is: "I thank you God, that you have not made me a gentile, a slave or a woman." There's a story about someone taking this prayer even further to demonstrate their distain of the immoral sinners.

The Pharisee standing by himself prayed thus: "God, I thank you that I am not like other men, extortionists, unjust, adulterers, or even like this tax collector."

Luke 18:11

Jesus is not like religious types who are known for the people they oppose. He loved sinners.

What's surprising is that sinners love Jesus. Jesus' moral teachings are the greatest the world has ever known, but it's the 'immoral' that flock to him and love to hear him speak. Jesus embraced them with open arms at great risk to himself. Jesus knew that those who are forgiven much appreciate much. He loves the gentiles, the slave and the women. He loves the sinners, foreigners, poor and the unclean. He lifted up the oppressed.

Jesus stood as the champion of the outcasts. He taught women though his culture prohibited education for women.

He looked for the people that society wanted to throw away because he saw a value in them that no one else did. He picked up society's garbage and with the inspiration of an artist he said, "Now, watch what I can do with them."

Jesus believed in them.

As you read through the life of Jesus pay attention to whom Jesus eats with. In his culture meals were used as a way of demonstrating who they are willing to socialize with.

Reading Today: Luke 2-3

Faith: Trusting Jesus

In Jesus' language Faith, Trust and Belief are the same word. He used them interchangeably but not the way you'd think.

It is only quality that impresses Jesus.

Our Faith.

He asked people to trust him. He was deeply impressed by people did trust him and he was hindered by people that would not believe him. He regularly healed people and then told them that it was their faith that saved them.

Jesus is not impressed by intellectual or athletic ability. Your acts of heroism don't even register. Trust is the only quality that Jesus cares about in us.

What does faith do?

Faith doesn't change the nature of reality. 2+2=4 no matter what you believe. No matter how physicists debate ideas of gravity, it still affects them all the same. My belief in the resurrection of Jesus doesn't change what happened that day. What does faith actually do?

How does it affect your life?

Does faith change the way God sees us?

The Son of Man Week 9

Do we trust God? There's a common understanding that faith in God amount to a belief in the existence of God.

But, there's a world of difference between "I believe that God exists, and I believe God." The former is impersonal. It requires no action and doesn't make a significant impact on the way we live life. We can go on as we see fit. God will do his thing, I will do mine.

My daughter believes that she has a father. That is a fact. But she also believes me when I say I will catcher her as she jumps into my arms.

The faith Jesus requires goes beyond a belief in a historical fact. It is a belief that compels action and puts us in a place of dependence and vulnerability on the object of our faith (himself).

But to say "I trust God" requires action and risk and a level of intimacy. What if you trust God and He doesn't come through for you? What if God does something that you weren't expecting? How can you rely on God? Will he ultimately do his will?

That's why it's important to put your faith in someone worthy of your trust.

Trusting God is not an intellectual exercise but leap of vulnerability. How does vulnerability allow for deeper experiences and gives the moments of our lives greater meaning?

What steps can you take to trust God more?

Day 1

Stories

Jesus knew that going to Jerusalem would mean his death but he also knew that death was why he came. After only 9 chapters, Jesus begins his march to destiny in Jerusalem. Along the way Jesus tells stories so that the people around him can understand what he's about to accomplish.

It was common in his day for people to tell stories called parables. They would tell parables that affirm their culture and lifestyle. It was a way of passing on values to their children. Stories often used characters that were particularly good, noble or virtuous.

In contrast Jesus told stories that centered around common every day themes: farmers, fishermen, shepherds. They were stories that working people could relate to. Jesus told parables that challenged his culture's values and lifestyle.

There are three stories in a row that all center on lost things being found. Each story is meant to tell us about what God is like and what he values. The first parable tells us how God is like a shepherd who looks for a lost sheep. He ignores the rest of the flock leaving them. to search high and low for the lost sheep to bring it back together. God made us to be social creatures and live in healthy communities. God's priority is to rescue the one in danger instead of maintaining the flock.

Lost and Found Week 10

The next story Jesus tells how God is like a woman who has lost a coin. In her economy the coin is a tenth of her life savings. She searched all over her house until she finds it and when she does find it she throws a party with her friends, celebrating her reunion with the coin. This shows how God values us, and He is overjoyed when we are reunited with him.

The third story is of a Prodigal father and 2 lost sons. The younger son was selfish, hedonistic and unwise in the way he spent money and dishonored his father in a culture where honor is everything. He became the cultural equivalent of a male escort. The son comes back to his father begging for a job as a domestic servant.

The father doesn't listen to his son's request for a servant's position. You can't negotiate with God as you enter his Kingdom. The father insists on restoring the position of his son. He throws a party celebrating the reunion with his son!

But the older son is also lost. The younger son was separated from his father because of foolish selfishness; the other son is still separated from his father out of a sense of righteousness.

The father's priority was reuniting with his younger son. The older son should have joined him in this pursuit. Instead He is busy in the field keeping up the family business. The older son is indignant at the celebration for his brother. What madness would possess his father to reward such foolishness? The older brother is lost because he only knows right and wrong but doesn't understand community and family. Even though the older brother is lost, the father invites his older son to join him

Through this story Jesus tells us how God is like a father who is looking for us and invites us to come celebrate with Him.

Reading Today: Luke 10-11

Prayers of Jesus

From the beginning to the end of his life Jesus deep in prayer. His mother Mary first found out she was pregnant and God had a special plan for her song. Her heart sang out a song of hope and joy thanking God for this blessing. She wasn't concerned by the disastrous social danger of being an unmarried teenage mother in a very conservative culture. She simply trusted that God's plan was greater than the struggle. She thanked God in prayer for her baby boy. I can't recommend this enough for expecting mothers to pray for their children.

Jesus prayed to God like he was talking to his Dad. He spoke naturally from his heart. He didn't follow the pattern of religious lofty speech he spoke to God honestly and openly. In the Garden before he was assassinated he spoke to God about the struggle of facing the cross. God didn't take away the obstacle but God gave him the strength to go through it and come out victorious. Aligned with God's perspective Jesus was able to see past his own pain on the cross and asked God to forgive the people who killed him. There was no pretense about looking good, just an honest love from God in extraordinary circumstances. That kind of love develops over time spent communicating honestly, openly and naturally with God.

Don't be discouraged if God says no when you ask for something. We are like children to God. Kids ask for many things that just aren't healthy for them. Any good parent will use wisdom and restraint responding to children with a loving no.

Lost and Found Week 10

If God says no, it's wise to accept it. His wisdom is deep beyond measure. It's ok to ask why? as you accept his refusal, you'd be surprised by the wisdom God wants to share with you. He really wants to train us to grow in wisdom and strength.

Prayer is also a good time to listen to God. God can communicate with us in many different ways. God has communicated with people through prophets, donkeys, rainbows, accumulation of dew on cloth, and on rare occasions an audible voice. One of the most reliable forms today is the Bible. It isn't a direct message from God to you personally, but you do get to eavesdrop on the conversations God has had with people in the past. It's a good way to get to know his character and recognize Him today.

There are obstacles when it comes to hearing from God. We can be too distracted, too self-absorbed, too busy. All the things that make it difficult to communicate with people around you, can affect communication with God.

Prayer empowers in a strange way. We can come to God frustrated, confused, exhausted. God gives us focus, refreshment and strength. We come to Him with joy and He shares in our delight. When we stop and listen to Him, He can give us vision and insight. We surrender to Him and He sets us free. Prayer is where we meet with God.

The Roman Road

One of Jesus' followers wrote a letter to his friends in Rome. In his letter he explains in big picture description what God has done for them through Jesus. Following his outline you can use this "Roman Road" as a way to describe your faith.

"No one is righteous—not even one. No one is truly wise; no one is seeking God. All have turned away; all have become useless. No one does good, not a single one." ... For everyone has sinned; we all fall short of God's glorious standard.

Romans 3:10-12, and 23

The separation from God leads to death.

For the wages of sin is death...

Romans 6:23

Jesus Christ took the death that was meant for us.

But God showed his great love for us by sending Christ to die for us while we were still sinners.

Romans 5:8

Trusting Jesus saves us from the death.

If you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For it is by believing in your heart that you are made right with God, and it is by confessing with your mouth that you are saved ... For "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved."

Romans 10:9-10, and 13

Trusting Jesus puts us back together with God in a right way.

Therefore, since we have been made right in God's sight by faith, we have peace with God because of what Jesus Christ our Lord has done for us.

Romans 5:1

So now there is no condemnation for those who belong to Christ Jesus.

Romans 8:1

And I am convinced that nothing can ever separate us from God's love. Neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither our fears for today nor our worries about tomorrow—not even the powers of hell can separate us from God's love. No power in the sky above or in the earth below—indeed, nothing in all creation will ever be able to separate us from the love of God that is revealed in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Day 1

Leader of All

Leadership requires trust

Authority from on high is given to men and women that can be trusted to accomplish their task. Any corporate officer that acts unprofessionally should start looking for another job. Without the trust from the decision makers and business owners you won't be able to keep your position.

Jesus knew that his authority came from on high, way up high. This put him at odds with the politics and people of power in the world around him. He refused to compromise the will of God. He would not pander to the movers and shakers of his day. He was incorruptible. The only deal he would offer was 'follow me.' This infuriated the rich and privileged who are used to clients catering to their whim.

Authority doesn't just come from on high. It also comes from the hearts and minds of the masses. We ultimately choose who we follow. People will suffer the tyranny no longer than they have to. The moment a viable alternative presents itself the people will choose the leader they can trust.

Leadership is built on trust. It may be a director appointing an officer that she can trust to get the job done. Or it may be an average guy choosing to support a leader that cares about him and can provide a better future. Both models require a trustworthy leader.

Jesus is the kind of leader people are willing to die for. Literally. It comes from the simple fact that He is trustworthy.

Making Jesus known

It's human nature to fear the unknown and trust what we know. So it stands that trusting Jesus could simply be an issue of getting to knowing him. How can you get to know more about Jesus? How can you help others to learn more about Jesus? What is the benefit of increasing your trust of Jesus? What kind of risks would you be willing to take to learn about how Jesus is trust worthy? What risks does Jesus ask you to take?

Day 2

Jesus the Savior

Jesus - the name literally means 'savior.' He said he came to seek and save the lost.

So, Who is lost? and How does Jesus save them?

Who is lost? - Everyone

It's easy to see how *some* unfortunate people could be lost. Caught in difficult life circumstances, following an unhealthy or destructive lifestyle; certainly *they* need to be rescued. But what about the rest of us who have things pretty much under control? We all start off disconnected from God (the source of life) and that puts us on a collision course with death. Everyone from the greatest to the least starts out lost and remains that way unless Jesus rescues them.

God sent us Jesus as a life line to get us connected with Him. Jesus accomplished this when he died on the cross and was resurrected from the dead. Everything that held us back and kept us separated from God was defeated. Jesus took it to the cross with him, buried and left it in the grave.

Jesus rescued us from way that leads to death and welcomes us to follow him on a way that leads to life. He is our savior.

Four Spiritual Laws

Just as there are laws that govern the physical universe, so are there spiritual laws that govern your relationship with God.

Law 1

God loves you and offers a wonderful plan for your life.

God's Love

"God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16).

God's Plan

[Christ speaking:] "I came that they might have life, and might have it abundantly" [that it might be full and meaningful] (John 10:10).

Law 2

Humanity is separated from God by sin Therefore, we cannot know and experience God's love and plan for his life.

Humanity is Sinful

"All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23).


We were created to have fellowship with God; but, because of our own stubborn self-will, we chose to go our own independent way and fellowship with God was broken. This self-will, characterized by an attitude of active rebellion or passive indifference, is an evidence of what the Bible calls sin.

Humanity Is Separated

"The wages of sin is death" [spiritual separation from God] (Romans 6:23).

This diagram illustrates that God is holy and humanity is sinful. A great gulf separates the two. The arrows illustrate that humanity is continually trying to reach God and the abundant life through our own efforts, such as a good life, philosophy, or religion

-but we inevitably fail.



The third law explains the only way to bridge this gulf...

Law 3

Jesus Christ is God's only provision for our sin.

Through Him you can know and experience God's love and plan for your life.

Jesus Died In Our Place


"God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8).

He Rose from the Dead

"Christ died for our sins, He was buried, He was raised on the third day, according to the Scriptures. He appeared to Peter, then to the twelve. After that He appeared to more than five hundred." (1 Corinthians 15:3-6).

Jesus Is the Only Way to God

"Jesus said to him, 'I am the way, and the truth, and the life, no one comes to the Father but through Me'" (John 14:6).



This diagram illustrates that God has bridged the gulf that separates us from Him by sending His Son, Jesus Christ, to die on the cross in our place to pay the penalty for our sins.

It is not enough just to know these three laws...

Law 4

We must individually receive Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord; then we can know and experience God's love and plan for our lives.

We Must Receive Christ

"As many as received Him, to them He gave the right to become children of God, even to those who believe in His name" (John 1:12).

We Receive Christ Through Faith

"Believe in the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved" (Acts 16:31)

This is a gift from God, not something we can earn

"By grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God; not as result of works that no

one should boast" (Ephesians 2:8,9).

All the work of putting us back with God's love and plan was done by Jesus when He died on the cross. This free gift is for all who believe. If you believe tell him right now out loud:

"Jesus, I believe that you saved me!"

Day 1

Visionary Portraits of Jesus

An aging John reflects back his years spent continuing the movement that Jesus started 60 years ago. As a young man, John followed Jesus in person. After Jesus rose from the grave and ascended into heaven, John took part in cultivating communities devoted to faith in Jesus as part of the kingdom. He saw the political and social resistance to Jesus intensify.

John studied the sacred scriptures recognizing his best friend and king in prophecies delivered from heaven to his people at an age long ago.

He can see the messages from the past are playing out in his lifetime as the mysteries of the future take form in front of him, swirling into a singular vision.

John can see the spiritual reality as clearly as the physical realities around us.

From this vision a lone figure emerges, his old friend Jesus stands before him in full majesty and titanic stature.

This week we're reading about four visionary pictures of Jesus in full spiritual glory.

The first sighting of Jesus he appears before his friend John. His eyes blaze like fire, his feet glow like molten metal. He is larger than life. With his hand he can touch stars.

By his clothes you can tell that he is a priest: mediator between heaven and earth by his reach there is no doubt he could touch heaven itself. Jesus literally stands as a bridge between heaven and earth.

The second sighting of Jesus takes place in the throne room of God where all the great wonders and marvelous works of God have been assembled. Nothing in all the cosmos is worthy to break the seals on the scroll containing God's proclamation. Finally God's crowning achievement enters the throne room for he alone is worthy to release God's scroll. Jesus enters in the form of bloody sacrificial lamb. He is worthy because of the sacrifice he made: his death on the cross.

The third sighting of Jesus takes place after a violent resistance sweeps the earth and everything in it. All forces political, spiritual, cosmic and mundane are caught up in a resistance to God's authority as the Kingdom that Jesus established expands around the earth. On the field of a final battle all the forces of evil have assembled. Jesus single handedly throws them down. With the last resistance to his Kingdom finally conquered the earth becomes a paradise a true slice of heaven.

Finally Jesus appears in the vision of another man: Daniel, a prophet from a time hundreds of years before Jesus's birth in Bethlehem. Daniel has a glimpse of Jesus in the throne room of "the ancient of days" - a title for God. In the throne room are gathered magnificent specimen from all parts of creation bowing before God in appreciation. Then in human form, Jesus enters the throne room as God bestows upon him all power in heaven and earth.

Day 2

Victory in Jesus

Jesus was executed as a criminal and a traitor. That should have been the end of the story but instead it's the beginning of a revolution.

It appeared that Jesus's movement had failed. He was arrested a traitor and sentenced to death. His followers were hiding for fear of their lives. His enemies physical, spiritual and political were congratulating themselves. They threw everything they had at Jesus and defeated him. Jesus took the failure and upped the ante. He invited death to unleash his full power at him. Defeated, broken and dead, they laid Jesus' body in a tomb covered by a boulder and guarded by Rome's finest.

Three days late Jesus rose from the grave like it was an afternoon nap. His enemies were undone. They had thrown everything they had at him. Jesus is unstoppable. He conquered death itself.

With this victory Jesus offers a promise: there is nothing you face as his follower that Jesus can't defeat. Take comfort in that. And remember be sure you are on his side in all things because in the end no one who opposes Jesus will stand.

Day 3

Christ Victorious

Jesus' death and sacrifice turned into victory isn't just a onetime fluke of the natural order. His sacrifice stands as the new model of victory for us to follow.

Jesus called his followers to "take up your cross." Everything we do for ourselves will someday be undone. Only what's sacrificed for Jesus will stand eternally. God ensures this victory.

All other organizations stand for the benefit of its own members and causes. Citizens of Jesus' Kingdom are expected to sacrifice what they have for the benefit of those who are not members.

Can you imagine living in a society where everyone lives to see others advance and prosper? Where all citizens look for ways to lift each other up? And every hardship is another opportunity to prove God's faithfulness. With gratitude we say to God, "not mine will but your will be done."

Behind the scenes note: this sacrificial society works based on a principal of water overflowing a cup. We learn to see how God's blessing like water is continuously pouring into us far beyond our needs. We become convinced that he supplies more than we need and the extra we can give generously to others around us. In all situations we can be content with what God gives us and pass the extras on to others.
